She was a founder of the Law School Consortium Project, which expands access to justice through law school support for solo and small firm practitioners who serve low- and moderate-income persons in their communities. Dean Glen is a fellow of the American and the New York State Bar Foundations and a member of the American Law Institute. She received a B.A. from Stanford University and a J.D. from Columbia University Law School, where she was a Harlan Fisk Stone Scholar.
