Name and descriptionAmeriCorps is a national service program of the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS), which engages tens of thousands of members in intensive community service each year.Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) works to ensure decent affordable housing, provide services to the most vulnerable in our communities, and create jobs through the expansion and retention of businesses.	<ul> <li>COVID-19 Update</li> <li>CARES Act authorizes CNCS flexibility to ensure AmeriCorps members can earn the Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards that they were due to receive before COVID-19 disrupted their service activities, and allows AmeriCorps grantees receiving fixed amount awards to access their full federal funding.</li> <li>CARES Act appropriates \$5 billion to respond to COVID-19 and its impact on the economy and housing. Of this:         <ul> <li>\$2 billion to states and units of local government that received funding in FY 2020</li> <li>\$1 billion to support a coordinated response among entitlement and non-entitlement communities</li> <li>\$2 billion to states and local government based on prevalence and risk of COVID-19 and economic and housing disruption.</li> </ul> </li> <li>There is an additional \$100 million to Indian CDBG.</li> <li>Legal services are generally considered "public services" for CDBG purposes. health. Edward Bryne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Bryne JAG) is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to states and units of local government. Byrne-JAG is the most flexible federal law enforcement grant program.	<b>CARES Act appropriates \$850 million</b> for a Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding <u>Program (CESF)</u> . CESF will assist states, local governments, and tribes in preventing, preparing for, and responding to the coronavirus.	Byrne JAG administrators apply for and administer the state allocation of CESF funding, following the Byrne JAG formula allocation mechanism. Allocations by state are <u>here</u> .

Section 330 for health centers is the primary funding source for health centers. Health centers, using "enabling services" language (see below), can fund legal services through medical-legal partnerships to address the social determinants of health.	<b>CARES Act appropriates \$1.32 billion</b> in supplemental awards for the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of COVID-19.	Legal aid is included in the range of <u>"enabling</u> <u>services"</u> that HHS-funded health centers can provide to meet communities' care needs. <b>Title IV-E (Foster care)</b> helps provide out-of-home care for children until the children are safely returned home, placed permanently, or placed in other planned arrangements.	Although the CARES Act does not provide new funds, the <b>Children's Bureau has</b> written a letter regarding the incorporation of technology in the COVID- 19 pandemic. <u>COVID-19 Letter from CB</u> : On March 27, 2020, Children's Bureau Associate Commissioner Jerry Milner sent a letter to Child Welfare Legal and Judicial Leaders outlining statutory requirements CB cannot waive. The letter outlines ways "courts can and should use flexible means of convening required hearings."
